Your generous contributions for Mass sponsorship during the Misa de Gallo or Aguinaldo Masses will be used to buy the statues of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and Mary, venerated as Our Lady of Consolation. But who is Our Lady of Consolation?



Mary, Our Lady of Consolation [4 September]

The Blessed Virgin Mary is honored as the Mother of Consolation because God sent Jesus Christ, the Comforter, to the world through her. This title, "Our Lady of Consolation" or "Our Lady of the Cincture," has been important to the Augustinian Order since the 17th century. The significance of this title for the Augustinians is closely connected to the lives of Saints Monica and Augustine, a mother and son. They are often depicted with Mary and the Child Jesus in various artworks. In these depictions, Jesus gives a cincture to Saint Monica and Saint Augustine as a symbol of consolation.

In 1439, the Augustinian Order received permission to establish groups of laypeople known as the "Confraternity of the Cincture." In 1495, the "Confraternity of St. Mary of the Cincture" was formed in an Augustinian church in Bologna. In 1575, several confraternities were merged to create the Archconfraternity of the Cincture, which received numerous indulgences from the Holy See.

According to tradition, Saint Monica, who was grieving the loss of her husband and the waywardness of her son, had a vision of Mary and the Child Jesus. They offered her comfort and handed her a leather cincture to wear as a visible reminder of their presence and encouragement. Monica wore the cincture from that moment on and, after her son's conversion, recommended it to him as a symbol of Mary's protection. This tradition made the cincture a primary symbol for all who follow the Rule of Saint Augustine.

The Augustinian Order venerates Mary – Our Mother of Consolation – to convey an understanding of the Mother of God as benefactress or patroness of her people, as one who responds to the many needs which humanity experiences. Mary is truly mother and sister to us, because as faithful disciple of her Son, she learned well the lessons of selfless love and generous service. As Mother of Consolation she is particularly near to those in need of companion-ship and comfort.

In 1652, Pope Innocent X encouraged the devotion to Our Lady of Consolation by establishing a confraternity. In 1642, a copperplate engraving representing Our Lady of Luxembourg was installed in a sanctuary that was also erected in the same year. This site stands as one of the most frequently visited Catholic pilgrimage destinations in north-western Europe and was honored with a visit by St. Pope John Paul II in 1987. Today, devotion to Our Lady of Consolation holds great significance in places such as Luxembourg, England, France, Japan, Manila, Turin, Malta, Australia, Venezuela, and others.
